TYPES OF RESPONSIBILITY

This week we are exploring the many different kinds of responsibility that will lead to you being a person of good character and a good British citizen:

MORAL RESPONSIBILITY: to other people, animals and the Earth. This means caring, defending, helping, protecting, preserving and sustaining all life. You are accountable for treating other people justly and fairly, for honouring other living things and being environmentally aware.

LEGAL RESPONSIBILITY: to British laws and the rules of your community. If there is a law you believe is outdated, discriminatory, or unfair, you can work to change, improve or eliminate it. You cannot simply decide to disobey it.

FAMILY RESPONSIBILITY: means treating your parents, siblings, and other relatives with love and respect, following your parents' rules and doing chores and duties at home.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY: As part of the community, you're responsible for treating others as you want to be treated, for participating in community activities and decisions, and for being an active, contributing British citizen. Pick up rubbish to keep the community clean. Read local and community newspapers to stay informed. Vote in elections when you are old enough.

RESPONSIBILITY TO CUSTOMS, TRADITIONS, BELIEFS AND RULES: These might come from your family, your community, your heritage, the country you live in or your faith. Learn what they are and do your best to respect and follow them.

PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY: It's up to you to become a 'person of good character'. Your parents, teachers, religious leaders and other caring adults will guide you, but only you can determine the kind of person you are and ultimately become.

Women's Football Week

Women's Football Week - 5th October to 9th October

Pupils were encouraged last week to try out lunchtime and after school girls only football sessions to highlight Women's Football Week. We sometimes use an apostrophe to replace a letter. Mostly commonly seen and used in:

Common mistakes - Confusion

'We was' instead of 'We were'
'Was' is singular 'we' is plural, so it should be 'were' because 'were' is plural (both are in the past tense).
