Headteacher and CEO's 'Thought for the week'

Dear Parent/Carer

I trust you and your families are all well. Our primary aim at Broadway Academy is to have all students attend school; this is important for their safety, wellbeing, academic progress and personal development. I am delighted that attendance at Broadway Academy is exceptional. Thank you for your ongoing support.

All students will break up for the February half term holiday on Friday 18th February and return on Monday 28th February.

We would like to advise you that there will be no half term FSM voucher provision from the local authority.

Behaviour and attitudes

We always receive very positive feedback about the behaviour of our students at Broadway. Thank you to all our parents for supporting the Academy when behaviour issues arise and ensuring students are ready, respectful and safe.

As you are aware we do have high expectations in terms of our uniform/equipment and the following must always be adhered to:

- No nose studs or rings
- No nail varnish or fake nails
- Plain stud earrings
- Mobile phones, earphones or pods can be brought into school for emergencies, but they are not to be seen in lessons or at break or lunchtime
- Coats must be taken off when entering the building from outside and must not be worn when transitioning between lessons
- A school bag is compulsory containing the necessary equipment e.g. pencil case, PE kit and planner. Pouches are not allowed.
- A blazer and tie must be worn at all times
- Suitable black shoes must be worn

Whilst these measures may seem small, they go a long way to help build students' self-resilience, responsibility, and organisation. Students will be rewarded and recognised for behaving and dressing in line with Academy values and your support in ensuring your child is appropriately dressed and equipped is greatly appreciated.

Furthermore, I would also like to thank you for ensuring that attendance at Broadway is nearly 10% above the national average! Our current focus is on improving students' punctuality to school and we recommend that students are in the building for 8.35am at the latest so that they are seated and ready to learn at 8.40am. We understand that some people may have valid reasons for

being late on occasions and are willing to work with you on this. However, if a student is late without a valid reason, they will lose their break time on the same day. If this occurs persistently then procedures are in place to escalate matters and parents can be fined for poor punctuality as well as poor attendance.

Extra-curricular activities

We have always been extremely proud of the commitment that our staff show in providing extra-curricular activities for our pupils and the enthusiasm that they have in participating in these. We are delighted that since restrictions have eased, we have been able to provide even more opportunities for our pupils to learn outside the classroom and gain a range of experiences that will equip them with the skills to succeed in life. All year 7 pupils have already had the opportunity to participate in a "Shipwreck Challenge" at our Island Pool Outdoor Education Centre and all of years 8, 9 and 12 will also have opportunity to take part in an outdoor education day there over the forthcoming months. All pupils who wish to build on the skills that they are introduced to whilst there continue to have the opportunity to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

Staff have planned a range of exciting trips throughout the academic year, and we offer a larger number of clubs and activities than ever before - it is fantastic to see such a wide number of pupils, with all sorts of different skills, taking part in these.

Recent developments include the re-launch of our House system (at the time of writing this Austin are winning overall); a STEM club running to try to encourage pupils to take up careers in Maths, Technology, Engineering and Maths; Sports Academies in basketball, cricket and football running incredibly successfully; student leadership growing massively across all year groups and a Cadet force being introduced to be introduced to year 9 pupils.

Please ensure that you keep an eye on the school newsletter and website to keep you up to date with all of these!

Safeguarding

This term staff have completed online safety training. As part of Safer Internet Day, all students have had a session from the West Midlands Cyber Crime unit on being respectful online, cyber-bullying, mental health, protecting your personal information and how and when to get help.

20 students from Broadway and Radley visited Edgbaston Cricket Club to work on a child safeguarding project for England Cricket Board.

Broadway Academy Working Farm

During the last term we have been busy developing our Broadway Academy working farm. We now have a 12-acre site down at Top Barn Farm, Worcestershire. We are currently developing the site and we have a flock of sheep who will be lambing in the very near future. The polytunnels are now in place ready for the students to get involved in horticulture. We aim to get all students down for a 'World of Work' residential experience during the spring and summer term.



2022 Exams

This half term has seen the completion of mock exams. Prior to Year 11 parent's evening, parents of Year 11 students will receive an interim report with the Mock exam result and a predicted grade as well as homework and effort grades. There is no simple preparation for the summer 2022 exams; hard work will pay off! Teachers are working in and out of class to make sure that students are prepared for the exams. Pupils must also work hard at home so that they are well prepared. Teachers have given revision guides and tips for revision so that pupils can focus on their areas for improvement. For further tips on how to revise, please see the useful attachment. Year 10 pupils have end of year exams to prepare for and all year groups have three topic tests each year.

Sixth Form Update

This year it is more important than ever that our young people are fully prepared for the upcoming exams. The Sixth form team are here to help in any way that we can. Please ensure that time to revise is given a priority wherever possible. Books and paper are a lot better than the internet, though please do encourage the use of webinars.

Students in both year 12 and 13 have been given revision planners. Please ask to see them and monitor to ensure they are keeping up with all of their studies.

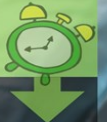
We have taken the decision to split the parents evenings so that there is sufficient time for staff to have meaningful conversations with parents about their child's progress.

House System

You may remember that in the last Newsletter we told you that we are re-vamping our House system with all pupils, from years 7 to 13 are assigned to a House. The aim of this is to encourage healthy competition amongst all year groups and give pupils a chance to represent their house in intra-school competitions.

The four Houses, and associated colours, are:
Austin (yellow)/Boulton (red)/Chamberlain (green)/Mason (blue)

All pupils have received a House badge and should be wearing it on the left lapel of their blazers, sixth formers wear these on their lanyards.

There will be a variety of competitions, PE and non-PE, throughout the school year and the House that wins an event will usually be awarded 4 points, with the House

that finishes 4th receiving 1 point.

SIMS positives will also be counted up each week and count towards the overall score - Houses will be ranked in each year group based on the sum of positives that pupils achieve each week, so everyone can contribute!

Each House is fronted by 2 Senior Teachers who deliver an assembly to the whole House once every half term. In addition, each year group will have two House Captains for every House. Their role is to help to organise teams and support, participate and encourage pupils in their House and year group.

The Anthea Bell Translation Prize

Broadway Academy Welcomes The Anthea Bell Translation Prize for Young Translators

For the first time this year Broadway Academy will be taking part in The Anthea Bell Translation Prize for Young Translators, which is an initiative of The Queen's College, University of Oxford Translation Exchange. The competition, which was launched in 2020, is inspired by the life and work of the English translator Anthea Bell, who was best known for her translation of children's literature, from French, German and Danish.

The aims of the competition are to promote language learning across the UK and to inspire creativity in the classroom and motivate more pupils to study modern foreign languages at school and beyond. Moreover, this competition supports the Broadway Academy values of Aspiration, Appreciation and Inclusivity. Students having exposure to authentic materials will also promote cultural capital and reinforce the skills of literacy and oracy.

The competition is divided into 4 levels in 4 languages, French, German Mandarin and Spanish. Entries to the competition are invited from years 7 to 13. Pupils can participate in the competition in as many levels and languages as they wish. The competition will take place over several weeks in spring 2022, the top five submissions for each level will be submitted.

All participants will receive certificates, and the national winners and runners-up will receive prizes donated by Penguin Classics, Vintage Classics and Oxford University Press.

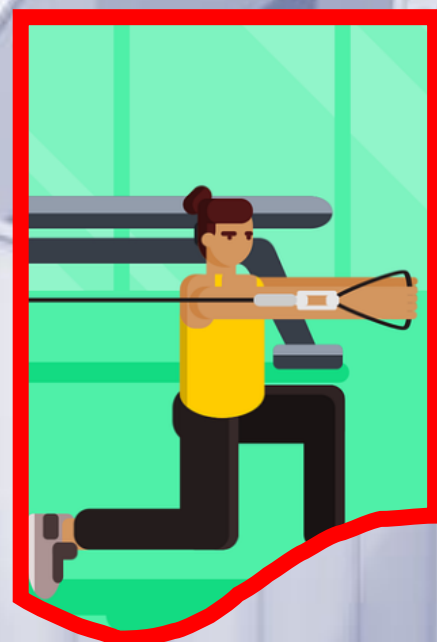
